FOUNDING OF THE CHARLES WILLIAMS SOCIETY

The founding of a Charles Williams Society has been considered for a long time. The weekend conference at The Royal Foundation of St. Katharine (Butcher Row, London E.14) entitled "Charles Williams - An Exploration", in October 1975, gathered such a large and varied group of people that a society became a real possibility.

After talking to many people at the Conference and some who did not come to it, Alice Mary and Charles Hadfield first told Charles Williams' son, Michael, of their proposal, and then invited Jenet and Philip Bovey, Xenia Howard-Johnston, Jim Lowry, Hilda Pallan, Anne Scott and Richard Wallis to come to their house (The White Cottage, 21 Randolph Road, London W.9) on 6th December, 1975, and talk about founding a society. In effect, this was the beginning. The basic objects were laid out in the prospectus for membership, which you have all received. Organisation then followed: Philip and Jenet Bovey produced the prospectus and drafted a constitution; Anne Scott started the library. Now we are preparing for the first meeting of the Society on the 15th May.
